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## He Led and We Followed

**Note:** If you had the opportunity to attend our Homecoming on Sept. 26th or if you've had the chance to watch it online, you know that we didn't have near enough time to share all our thoughts and memories about James Balcom, who passed away July 12th. We have chosen to dedicate this newsletter to James and to say a few final words of appreciation.

n August of 1987 following graduation from Freed-Hardeman University, I returned to Paragould to begin my first real job search of adulthood. Like most college graduates, I just knew the first person I went to see was going to embrace me and say "you are just what I was looking for – you're hired!"

While I didn't know exactly what I wanted to do with my degree, I did know that I preferred to work in a faith-based environment. My job search took me to Children's Homes, Inc. and to a man named James Balcom. I knew of James because I had gone to school with his children, but I didn't really know

him. But, it didn't really matter because I knew he was going to fall in love with me

from the first handshake.



I walked confidently into his office and touted my talents only to hear the words all new college graduates hate to hear... "you need to go get some experience." Deflated, I left his office and continued my job search. I eventually did find my first job followed by many more through the years. However, I never could get working at Children's

Homes, Inc. out of the back of my mind.

Nearly 13 years later after getting all that experience James said I needed, I was finally granted the opportunity to join the family at Children's Homes, Inc. in March of 2000.

From my first day of employment at Children's Homes, Inc. I was amazed at what James could accomplish. I have said many times that James was a visionary. James was also a leader. He didn't envision something then wait for everyone to bring it to fruition. He saw a path, then he led the way down that path, and we were happy to follow.

Now, to be very honest, James' ideas and paths didn't always turn out as he had hoped. I can remember a few times when he was bound and determined to do something that ended up not so great in the end. But, visionary leaders are willing to step out and try things even when they know they might fail. They are not fearful of failure. They are fearful of not trying.

The list of successful improvements at Children's Homes, Inc. under James' leadership is long. The list of things tried during his tenure is much longer. James never saw failure as the end. He viewed failure as a learning experience that led to a better success.

Through our years together, James and I developed a relationship that I can only liken to a relationship between a father and a son. I have been blessed with a biological father who is second to none. I was also blessed with a work father in James. He pushed me to grow in ways I didn't know were possible.

My relationship with James changed most significantly when he made the decision to retire from being the executive director. James knew things were changing in the non-profit world, and he just didn't want to go through those changes. While he didn't want to leave CHI, he no longer wanted the responsibility of the day-to-day operational duties. He often said, "We need to find someone with more attention to details."

When I went to James to express my interest in becoming the executive director, he leaned back in his desk chair and said, "I've just been waiting for you to come tell me." It was at that moment that I realized James had more faith in me than I did in myself. He saw potential in people and worked to draw out that potential. He recommended me as his replacement and the rest, as they say, is history.

For the next year, James and I spent a whole lot of time together. He was passing down to me what he thought were the most important things I needed to know as I transitioned into the role of executive director. One would think we filled that year with lots of paperwork and lessons about financial statements and licensing standards, but we didn't. James had built a team of people who were very talented in all these areas. He was more concerned with passing down his relationships to me.

He took me to see the people who had been his support system for so many years. He wanted them to know he had faith in me. He wanted them to support me like they did him. We weren't out raising funds. We were raising friends. If you were James-approved, you were approved.

Of course, we also made a point to stop at every Dairy Queen we could in our travels. James loved ice cream. It intrigued me how he knew the location of every Dairy Queen. We would be traveling down an interstate and he would say, "There's a Dairy Queen on the left in two exits."

James mentored me into becoming his replacement. That mentoring didn't stop in September of 2004 when I officially became executive director. James didn't walk away from CHI. He became a full-time friend raiser and a personal advisor.

He was always available when something arose for which I needed help or advice. I turned to James a lot in the early years until I got my feet under me. I didn't always need an answer. Many times I just needed a listening ear from someone who had walked the path I was going down before me. James was to me what Vance Greenway was to him.

As the years passed and James' health began to decline, he wasn't able to come to the office too often. But, he continued to send me messages of encouragement through emails and messages from Charlene. While I didn't see him, I always knew he was in my corner and praying for me.

James was loved and followed by thousands of people who shared his vision for Christian childcare. He rallied people to support this ministry because he helped people see how children were not being cared for as God would want. He worked to make life better for children. He loved to see them finally smile when life was good. He was not a perfect man, but he was a great man.

His desire to help children spread way beyond Children's Homes, Inc. James felt all children everywhere should have better lives, so he set out to strengthen standards for caring for hurting children. He often bragged (in a good way) about being appointed to the Arkansas Child Welfare Agency Review Board by five governors. He was recognized

## CHI VISIONARY JAMES BALCOM PASSES AWAY

n an otherwise calm Sunday evening in July, Children's Homes, Inc.'s executive director Micah Brinkley sent out a message to CHI employees that we were all dreading.

There's a sad inevitability to the combination of illness and age. Everyone who received that message knew it had been looming for a couple of years. That knowledge didn't make the words sting any less.

James Balcom had passed away.

The tributes and kind words started flowing freely mere minutes after the news hit.

One employee called James "A true hero for thousands of kids and fearless defender of pure religion." Another shared, "What an example he has set for the rest of us!"

The quickest way to refer to James is to call him CHI's former director. But he wore many hats. He started with CHI as a houseparent. Then he was instrumental in Children's Homes beginning to facilitate adoptions and foster care. He hatched the plan to start the Change for Children campaign that has raised more than \$6.5 million in donations. CHI accumulated a list of most of the achievements met during his tenure, and it's an impressive list (His obituary featured on page 7 covers several of them.) What we're focusing on in this edition of Spectrum is memories of the man, not necessarily his accomplishments (though they are many).

In addition to bringing about so many accomplishments for CHI, James was a recruiter, a cheerleader, a mentor, a father figure, a jokester, a friend and a fine Christian example. Which one of those roles was most prominent would depend on who you're asking. And that's what we're interested in with this issue of *Spectrum* — hearing from the individuals he impacted. And they are many.

What almost everyone mentions when recalling James is his sense of humor. That's why we think he'd approve of the headline to the left for its multiple meanings. Yes, he's holding jars of coins or change. There's the joke, the part that might have gotten a giggle out of James — if we were lucky. The serious part lies in how he will be remembered —as a man who was committed to bringing about a change for the better for countless children in need and as a man that saw good in others (often when they didn't see it themselves) and knew just how to spark them to change

and live up to their potential.

We've gathered recollections from many who have worked with him over the years. You'll see those stories and memories over the next several pages, with photos sprinkled in here and there. We also have a final message of sorts from James himself in the form of his mission and vision statement he wrote in the 1990s.

In conjunction with our annual Homecoming, 7th and Mueller Church of Christ hosted a celebration of James' life on Sept. 26. Video of the event is available on Children's Homes, Inc.'s Facebook page and website (childrenshomes.org) for those who were unable to attend or view the live stream. It's our wish that this edition be an extension of that heartwarming event.

So grab a tissue or two, take a moment and join us as we remember our former leader, our friend, our Agent of Change —James Balcom.


## JAMES BALCOM • 1938-2020

James Warren Balcom, 81, passed from this life at his home in Paragould, Ark., on July 12, 2020, with his beloved wife, Charlene, by his side. He was born Sept. 26, 1938, in Trumann, Ark., to Tom Lester Balcom and Eltha Pearl Lee Balcom.

He was preceded in death by his parents and two brothers, Lester Balcom and Charles Balcom.

He is survived by his wife of 57 years, Charlene Lee Balcom of the home, his children, Veda and Randy Smith of Glendale, Ariz., Walter Balcom of Walnut Ridge, Ark., Blair and Stacy Balcom of Fairdealing, Mo., Martha Balcom of Paragould, Ark., and Warren Balcom of Little Rock, Ark.; 23 grandchildren, 36 great grandchildren, a sister, Lou Balcom Fain (George) of Ocean Springs, Miss., a brother, Tommy Balcom (Brenda) of Trumann, Ark., and several nieces and nephews.

James worked at Children's



Homes, Inc. over a span of 50+ years as a houseparent, foster parent, social worker, Executive Director and Executive Director Emeritus. Many of the current programs of Children's Homes, Inc. were implemented under James' oversight. He was a visionary.

He was also a private business owner at one point and a teacher, having taught English and Spanish at Crowley's Ridge Academy early on in his career. He also served for a short period of time in the United States Navy.

Even after his 'retirement' from paid work, he remained on the job encouraging people to support the ministry at Children's Homes, Inc. until his health no longer permitted him to do so.

He served on numerous state and national committees and boards that worked to protect children by strengthening the policies that provide care for those children. One such board was Arkansas' Child Welfare Agency Review Board, of which we was a founding member and served by appointment under five governors. He put his heart and soul into helping children.

In his spare time, he loved to garden. He was well-known for canning fresh salsa and pickles. He also loved to tell a good story, and his laugh was infectious. ames Balcom was one of my dad's favorite people. Before I met James, Dad said, "I have a friend I want you to meet. He is one of the kindest men I have known." James lived up to his reputation. I knew I would love him ... Dad said I would!

James Balcom became one of my favorite people. I wonder how many times we will read that as multitudes of people are processing their mixture of grief and joy for our dear friend.

We were sitting at a Wendy's in Paragould when James and Leo Rainey asked me to work with Families First Foundation. I was just overwhelmed with their persuasion ... "Bill, we need someone to work with FFF, and you're someone!"

In regard to the founding of FFF, the names of James and Leo must be spoken together. Both of them had tremendous passion for their personal ministries (Children's Homes and Spanish Ministry). We were blessed with the overflow of their enthusiasm, dedication, and leadership. James chose the name for FFF.

James must have invented the smile! He was rarely without one. His laughter was infectious ... especially following one of his jokes! My favorite was that he had something in common with the apostle Paul — James said he "buffeted" (as in eating) his body daily! Seriously, he had more in common with Paul than that, but James would have denied it.

Thanks, Dad, for introducing me to your friend. He became my friend!

Thank you, Charlene, for freely sharing James with us! Our love to you, the children, and all the family. Thank you, Lord, for our dear friend, James. You knew him before birth, and we are sure that you are pleased to have your child home.

y association with James Balcom goes way back to when I was preaching at West Plains in the 1990's. I would jokingly tell James, "You have to come in May and kick off this Change for Children Campaign or this church is not going to participate". He would tell his staff to "save him a Wednesday night for Arvil."

James and Charlene would drive to West Plains, he would preach, then we would distribute the cans. Afterwards a group would go to the Dairy Queen and the blind man Bill Burris would buy us all ice cream. He and James would joke with each other until Charlene would say, "James, we need to go."

I started with CHI as the gardener. James was a super gardener so this put our bonds even closer.

Our first area-wide fellowship fish fry was at Salem, Arkansas. James was already very sick, but he had to go. He was to ride home with Sally and me. She started to get in the back seat, but James said he wanted to ride in the back and sleep. However that man talked all the way home. He was so excited-135 people from 12 congregations came to support the children in our care. What memories!

Bad health began to close James down. About once a week I would drive him to Jonesboro for his cancer treatment. We got to visit.

As my boys grew up and moved to college, our connection with James and Charlene only deepened. I came to know I was loved by this couple, and my children were blessed to be treated as family. Somewhere along the way the Balcoms became our family, too. And going over to check on James or help around their home became an honor and reason to stay a while and spend time with a man I had come to admire in so many ways. I always made sure to allow extra time when I went because I came to love listening to his stories. His wisdom, joy and laughter were not matched by another!

James had a genuine care for others. He was always looking to be a blessing to others. Like every time I visited, he would not let me leave until I agreed to take some pickles. I never had the heart to tell him I did not like pickles, but I guess he knows now! James, I want you to know that I always found someone to enjoy them, so they were not wasted. Thank you for being my friend and, above all, a man of God. I love you and will miss you. Till we see each other again.

'n an example of what seemed like really bad timing, I started working at Children's Homes, Inc. two days after James' final day of official employment. For a couple of months, all I knew of James was the vacant office with the giant desk that was a couple of doors away from mine and a handful of plaques, photos and certificates that graced the hall leading up to it. I met Charlene on my first day, but I suppose the scene was being set for James to make a dramatic entrance.

It took a couple of months, but we finally did meet. As more evidence of bad timing, James was ill from the moment I met him. The first lengthy interaction I had with him came in the form of his going away party, which was delayed a couple of times due to bad weather. When CHI was finally able to wish him a fond farewell, he had already been gone nearly three months.

More bad timing. Or maybe not. If it had happened when it was supposed to, I would have missed out on the event entirely. As it was, some of my first impressions of the man were affected by his fellow employees sharing epic, heartwarming and usually hilarious stories about him. It was then that I started to grasp what James meant to Children's Homes, Inc. Sure, he implemented so many of the programs that are in place, but a person could do all that and not necessarily be loved or even liked. James was adored. It wouldn't take long before I figured out why.

James may well have been the king of the encouragers. After a couple of newsletters, which I put together, James got word to me how nice he thought it looked. He'd email me on occasion to remind me, and then when his health declined where he didn't feel like emailing any more, he'd send word through Charlene every so often. A compliment from anyone is a nice little boost. A compliment from James could probably carry a person right through life, because you knew he wouldn't say it if he didn't mean it deeply. I wonder just how many people he pushed to great things who might otherwise not have accomplished much without his well-timed encouragement. With that in mind, I can't complain that the timing of my start at CHI might have been a little off. Late or not, I was able to meet him and know him a little, and that is a huge blessing.

y very first memory of James was when I was a little girl at Nettleton Church of Christ. He came to speak ■about Children's Homes, Inc., and I remember always looking forward to him coming. He was always so friendly and paid attention to me even though I was a little kid.

I was talking to a co-worker about our memories of James. It wasn't until talking to her that I realized how much James always shifted the attention away from him. He always paid attention to others and made them feel special. That's why I feel this year's Homecoming and this issue of Spectrum are so important, because we can honor a man who loved others and God more than himself. I hope we can all learn from his example.

ames Balcom taught me how to advocate for youth described in James 1:27 at state and federal levels of government, how to influence legislation to protect children and the significance of my vote at the ballot box. James and I also fought to protect the church's mandate to practice pure religion in a society increasingly becoming secular.

I Corinthians 4:7 defines humility as "realizing that God and others are responsible for the achievements in my life." James mentored me like a father would his son. He demanded I take risks and supported me when the outcomes were negative. James showed me how to make tough decisions and handle failure, learn from it, and move forward. He taught me to accept change, adapt and rely on the unchanging God of heaven. He implored me to duplicate myself. Pass onto others what you've learned from me.

In sum, James taught me how to be a mature Christian man. James trained me to advocate for children from hard places in Arkansas, around the

nation, and in locations around the world. He taught me to look up instead of down, forward instead of backwards, and to take risks because change is inevitable but God is always there to make happen what we thought could never happen: Isaiah 40:31.

I will miss arriving home after a trip with James and pretending with Charlene that we had both been good and had not stopped at Dairy Queen on the way home.

James was a mentor. He saw great value in sharing the past through many examples of sacrifice and hard work by others who laid the foundation for the work done at CHI. He instilled in me an appreciation for the past and a desire to move forward and explore ways to improve our ministry. James also introduced me to many new friends. He loved people and taught me it's best to be a "friend raiser" rather than a "fundraiser". Because of this approach I now have many friends that are some of the best people on the planet and I very much enjoy staying connected with them as partners in the work at CHI.

James was a visionary and a leader. He was never

satisfied with the status quo and was driven to try new things with a mindset that "we can always do better." For many of his employees, this approach was, at times, frustrating and sometimes downright scary. He would push his employees to get out of our comfort zones and try to do things we'd never done before. However, he allowed mistakes and was very supportive when they occurred. Due to his leadership and vision, Children's Homes blazed a trail that many others would follow and the ripple effect will be felt for generations to come.

He loved staying connected and hearing from former residents who'd become successful adults and were actually putting into practice the skills and attributes that so many on the CHI team worked to instill. He was proud of them and I'm certain his pride encouraged them to continue to stay on the right path.

I've wondered if, as a child, James Balcom may have felt a sense of destiny when he heard the words of another James....., James 1:27.

His legacy will live for many generations and we should all take note of the lessons we can learn from the good attributes James embodied. I look forward to seeing him again, someday.



## SAFE MINISTRY MINUTE HOW TO PLAN A FALL FESTIVAL IN 2020

#### **Ensure a Sweet Time by Minding Tips on Social Distancing**

Wondering if you can still host a fall festival, trunk-or-treat, or similar event this year? It depends on where you live, as well as how much risk you're willing to assume. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that you assess the current COVID-19 levels in your community before making that call. If local health officials allow gatherings amid COVID-19, offering low-risk activities that follow CDC recommendations may give your community a small taste of "normal." With some creativity, your church or school may be able to modify one or more of its autumn traditions.

#### **Lower the Risk Posed by Traditional Activities**

Many Fall traditions, such as hayrides, trick-or-treating, and trunk-or-treat events, are being discouraged this year by the CDC. It says people should avoid these higher risk activities to help prevent the spread of the virus that causes COVID-19. It also offers alternatives that reduce the risk. The lowest risk activities involve staying at home.

If your ministry decides to host an event this fall, despite the risk, it's important to take precautions designed to limit the possible spread of disease. For starters, limit the number of people who can attend your event, based on recommendations set by your local health department. One way might be to require advance registration and give people assigned arrival times. Next, require everyone to wear protective face coverings. A costume mask should not replace a protective mask.

Finally, take additional measures to lower the risk of infection by hosting an outdoor event with appropriate social distancing and sanitation. See the CDC's recommendations on hosting gatherings.

#### **Parking Precautions**

Much like the drive-in worship services some churches offered this year, it's important to provide adequate space between cars. This can be done by staggering occupied spaces in a parking lot or by making sure vehicles are at least six feet apart.

You'll want to clearly designate and secure separate areas for the following:

- -Decorated cars participating in the trunk-or-treat
- -Parking for families who are bringing their kids
- -An area for games/food, etc.

To prevent accidents that can happen when children mix with cars:

Have a designated time for people to get their decorated cars in place before the event starts and a designated time to pull their cars out after the event ends. This minimizes car movement during the event. Remind participants to keep their cars turned off for the entire event. Ensure all children are a safe distance away before allowing cars to move. Watch for children darting into unsecured areas.

#### **Considerations for Volunteers**

Many volunteers will be necessary for the event to proceed smoothly. Consider how many you will need to do the following:

- -Guide decorated vehicles to their spaces for the trunk-or-treat
- -Direct traffic in and out of your parking lot
- -Limit event attendance, per your local health department
- -Control the flow of participants

Remind guests to stay home if they have been exposed to COVID-19 in the past 14 days or are showing COVID-19 symptoms.

as a man of knowledge and action. Former Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee shared the following comment with me about James. "James Balcom spent his life helping children to know love and safety. His heart was filled with God's love for those who didn't have power, money or influence - the children. But, because they mattered so much to God, they mattered to James. His work will live beyond him and his character lives within thousands of children whose lives were impacted by him."

Representatives from the review board on which James served for so many years also shared their remembrances of James.

Charles Flynn, Director of **Operations for Arkansas Baptist** Children's Homes and Family Ministries remembers meeting James for the first time at a conference in 1992. "Even then James was doing a skit about the World's Oldest Living Childcare Worker," he said. "What I

remember about him then was the same thing I saw on James' 80th birthday party ... that genuine smile, not just on his mouth, but a smile in his eyes, and the comfort and joy that he brought to a room."

Sanford Tollette, Executive Director of the Joseph Pfeifer Kiwanis Camp in Little Rock, Ark., added, "James was a lion to help humanity. He had a gentle paw and spirit that made him gently persuasive to get you to walk in a direction for a great good. James lifted me in a way I'll never forget."

Like these and others, I learned from James that Children's Homes, Inc. was there to do something for children that they couldn't do for themselves. Whatever their need. we had to fill it. Whatever their goal, we had to help them reach it. Whatever their struggle, we had to help them win the battle.

It is my daily prayer that I am able to lead Children's Homes, Inc. with as much vision and passion as James Balcom. People tell me often that

James made a good choice when he recommended me to succeed him. I think about it often, and when I do, I am reminded of a passage found in the book of Luke. Luke 6:40 says, "A disciple is not above his teacher, but everyone who is fully trained will be like his teacher." I could have no greater compliment for my work at Children's Homes, Inc. than to hear someone say "You are just like James."

I do want to close with a thank you from the Balcom Family for all the love and kindness shown to them during James' extended illness and passing. They have felt your love from near and far, and they have been so appreciative of all the people who have made memorial gifts to Children's Homes, Inc. in memory of James. Please continue to keep Charlene and the family in your prayers.
